Founders' Day | October 14, 2018

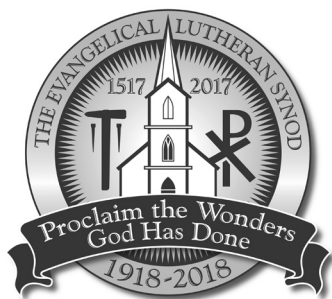
Today the Evangelical Lutheran Synod observes the centennial of its reorganization. Although the synod was reorganized in June 1918, the date of October 14 bears special significance because of its importance to the Norwegian Synod.

The Norwegian Synod was organized in 1853. Six years later, the synod's first joint undertaking was the establishment of a professorship for the training of pastors. The position officially began on October 14. This date became known as "Founders' Day" and had such importance to the Norwegian Synod that it became the dedication date of many buildings for congregations and synodical institutions.

In 1918, the synod was reorganized as the Evangelical Lutheran Synod to "continue in the old doctrine and practice." Since then, the synod has observed the dual anniversaries of 1853 and 1918. For many years after the synod's reorganization, the mid-October date continued to be observed as a public declaration that the ELS is the rightful successor to the teachings of the Norwegian Synod which held to the two fundamental principles of the Reformation: that the Bible is the inspired Word of God and that salvation is received by grace alone.

During this centennial year, the ELS follows this tradition by observing "Founders' Day" as a special opportunity to thank and praise God for one hundred years of His wonders and blessings. He has richly and daily provided for us. He has purchased and won us from all sin through His Son. He has sanctified and kept us in the one truth faith. May grateful hearts overflow with thanks and praise.

THE DIVINE SERVICE — RITE ONE


(pp. 41–49, 57–59 in *The Evangelical Lutheran Hymnary*)

*This order of service, known as the "Bugenhagen Order," grew out of the Lutheran Reformation. It was provided for use in the churches of Denmark and Norway in 1537 by Johannes Bugenhagen, Martin Luther's pastor. Minor revisions were made to this service in 1685 and 1889 before it was translated into English for **The Lutheran Hymnary** (1913). The service printed here comes directly from the **Evangelical Lutheran Hymnary** (1996). With the exception of the first hymn by Martin Luther, the rest of the hymns are by Scandinavian authors.*



THE OPENING PRAYER

THE EXORDIUM & HYMN

Four months and 100 years ago today on June 14, 1918, Pastor Bjug Harstad joined a group of almost 200 Lutherans gathered at Lime Creek Lutheran Church. They were all that remained of a once mighty synod, the Norwegian Synod, which had now been abandoned.

Pastor Harstad lamented the loss: "We are, as it were, clustering around the old building site which is storm swept and waste. A destructive hurricane has swept away the dear old mansion, even taking with it most of them that dwelt there. Discouraged, looking around, we discover only the bare ground with wreckage and dangerous crossroads. Yet let us not be too much alarmed nor discouraged. Worse things have repeatedly happened to the church before this, without its being destroyed."

Tragic things had taken place. For the sake of external unity with other Scandinavian Lutherans, the larger part of the Norwegian Synod had agreed to a compromise on the

doctrine of election. The impression was given that a person could believe, teach, and confess that a sinner plays some part in his conversion. But if salvation depends in any way on the sinner, all certainty is lost. To the contrary, said Pastor Harstad, “our happiness and salvation we will build solely upon the call of God, when He by visible and undeceiving means chose and rescued us from the power of Satan and our flesh, and adopted us as His disciples and children.”

The old institutions might have been gone, but the remnant at Lime Creek still had the powerful, unchanging Word. God’s Word does not return to Him void. By the power of the Holy Spirit, this Word of grace creates faith in the hearts of sinners and keeps them in the faith. The assembly at Lime Creek resolved to go forward on the old paths of God’s Word, the same paths we are blessed to walk today. With grateful hearts, we now rise to sing:

Grant that we may live together in peace and prosperity. Bestow upon us good and seasonable weather; and bless us with upright Christian counsel in all that we undertake.

The synod’s Centennial Committee announced the anniversary logo to be used for two significant anniversaries: The year 2017 marks the 500th anniversary of the Lutheran Reformation. The year 2018 marks the 100th anniversary of the reorganization of our *Evangelical Lutheran Synod*. At the center of the logo—which has been designed by *Bethany Lutheran College* professor Andrew Overn—is the *Lime Creek* church building located near Lake Mills, Iowa. It was here that the synod was reorganized in 1918 to continue in God’s word and Luther’s doctrine pure. To the left is a hammer and two nails, reminding us of the day when Martin Luther posted the “Ninety-Five Theses.” To the right is the symbol of the *Evangelical Lutheran Synod*, the “Chi Rho.” This symbol is made from the first two letters of “Christ” in the Greek language and emphasizes the importance of keeping Jesus at the center of our teachings. The dates at the top of the logo are the quincentennial anniversary dates of 1517–2017 for the Reformation. The dates at the bottom of the logo are the centennial anniversary dates of 1918–2018 for the *ELS*. The banner across the logo bears the anniversary theme, “Proclaim the Wonders God Has Done”, from a hymn of Martin Luther. During these anniversary years, we wish to look back both at what God has done and also to proclaim His name, His deeds, and His salvation to a new generation and to a generation yet to be born.
