**This summer** the Gift of Life Mobile Clinics have continued their mission of bringing free medical and dental care to those most in need, traveling from western Ukraine to the country's heartland.

One of the most moving visits took place at the Ternopil Educational and Rehabilitation Center, where our team provided care to children with special needs. The staff shared how the children felt safe and valued during their checkups—thanks to the gentle, clear communication and kind approach of our medical professionals.

The clinic then visited the villages of Pochapyntsi and Bila in the Ternopil region where many residents lack access to affordable medical services. Thanks to the warm welcome of the local communities, dozens of people received vital health screenings and dental care—a lifeline for families still coping with the economic and emotional toll of war.

In Zakarpattia, our team served internally displaced persons and other vulnerable groups in the Nevytske, Onokivska community—a region that has offered refuge to many fleeing from active combat zones. A Memorandum of Cooperation was signed with local authorities to strengthen long-term response efforts in the region.

More recently, our team has been working in a children's camp in the Ivano-Frankivsk region, offering

In September, we plan to resume clinic outreach to central and eastern Ukraine—to regions most deeply impacted by the war. Please keep our team and those we serve in your prayers as we continue this mission of mercy, hope, and healing. ■

Books: Last month we published Glen L. Thompson's book on the history of the ancient and medieval church, compiling two books published in English in a Latvian edition. Another book by Glen L. Thompson on the Nicene Creed, dedicated to the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea, is currently being translated and is in the stage of layout. "The Gospels" by ELS theologian Joh. Ylvisaker is going through final literary editing.

The second joyful event is the restoration of the facade of the Kekava church building. The church was consecrated in 2002 and its facade had suffered from the weather. The president of the parish found funds and builders, who in a couple of weeks applied new plaster and restored the facade to its original beauty.

Third, but not least in terms of importance, is the first participation of our parish president and theology student Juris Matvejs in a church service as a vicar.

Finally, we have a young boy who is seriously interested in the theology of the cross and that allows us to look to the future with confidence.

In all of these matters, in one way or another, there is also your support, and for that, dear friends, my sincere thanks and God's blessings. ■






The second week of July, Martin Luther School and St. Paul Lutheran Church held a VBS in Pilsen. The title of this article is the motto of the museum we visited during our VBS week on July 9th. Surely, this theme would be a great one for any Bible class discussion. **We must not forget the great victory that our Savior has won over our worst enemy.**

This year, the city of Pilsen celebrated the 80th anniversary of the end of WW II in Europe and the liberation of Pilsen by the U.S. Army on May 6, 1945. There are still a few people alive, who remembered, or even participated in the war, for example, Harry Humanson (see photo).

At the museum, we saw a Russian T-34 tank (still capable of driving). A mural includes a painting of an American Sherman tank in the town of Rokycany. Students from Martin Luther School, ages 8-13, participated in the VBS. MLS religion teachers conducted the VBS. They included M. Vrsecky (on the right in the picture) and M. Tibitanci in the middle (the man with the hat).

Some stories really shouldn't be forgotten, but well preserved and kept in our common memories. I would recommend our readers to search for "The last days of the war." Look for stories from April and May of 1945, when the "Nazi Beast" was about to die. The Thirty-Year War ended in Prague, and World War II as well... The Museum, a former military base from Communist times, with various historical military vehicles, helped us understand many things about our history.

Many children are eagerly looking forward to next year's VBS. ■
